... PREFACE ...

IN response to many calls for a small book for Sunday-schools this collection is issued.

To make a small collection that will fill the place of a large one is a greater undertaking than is generally supposed. It is to presume that every piece included is the best of its kind, and will become popular with the people.

The editors submit their work, believing it will be a success.

Those who adopt a small book assume a responsibility. It is that they give every song a faithful trial with the people, for that, after all, is the supreme test; they are the highest tribunal. Let the leaders put aside any preconceived notions or prejudices, if they have any, and submit each song impartially to their singers in a favorable trial, not only once, but a sufficient number of times, to test them as to their actual merit.

We have included a few of the well-known, standard pieces, intending to add still others in No. 2, so that when the future numbers are bound together they will comprise the standard pieces as well as new favorites.

No. 2 will be published as soon as we see a sufficient demand for it. We will be pleased to receive suggestions from those who use this collection as to how we may make it an improvement.

To those who may wish a larger collection than this we mention "Fillmores' Gospel Songs," a new book by the same authors, to be ready February 1, 1898. It includes many of the best pieces in this book, being adapted to the use of Sunday-schools, young people's meetings, prayer-meetings, and revivals.

To those who are looking for a book for small children we call attention to "Fillmores' Jewels for Little Singers," a new book to be ready February 1, 1898. It will contain all the songs of this collection adapted to little children, and many more in great variety.
