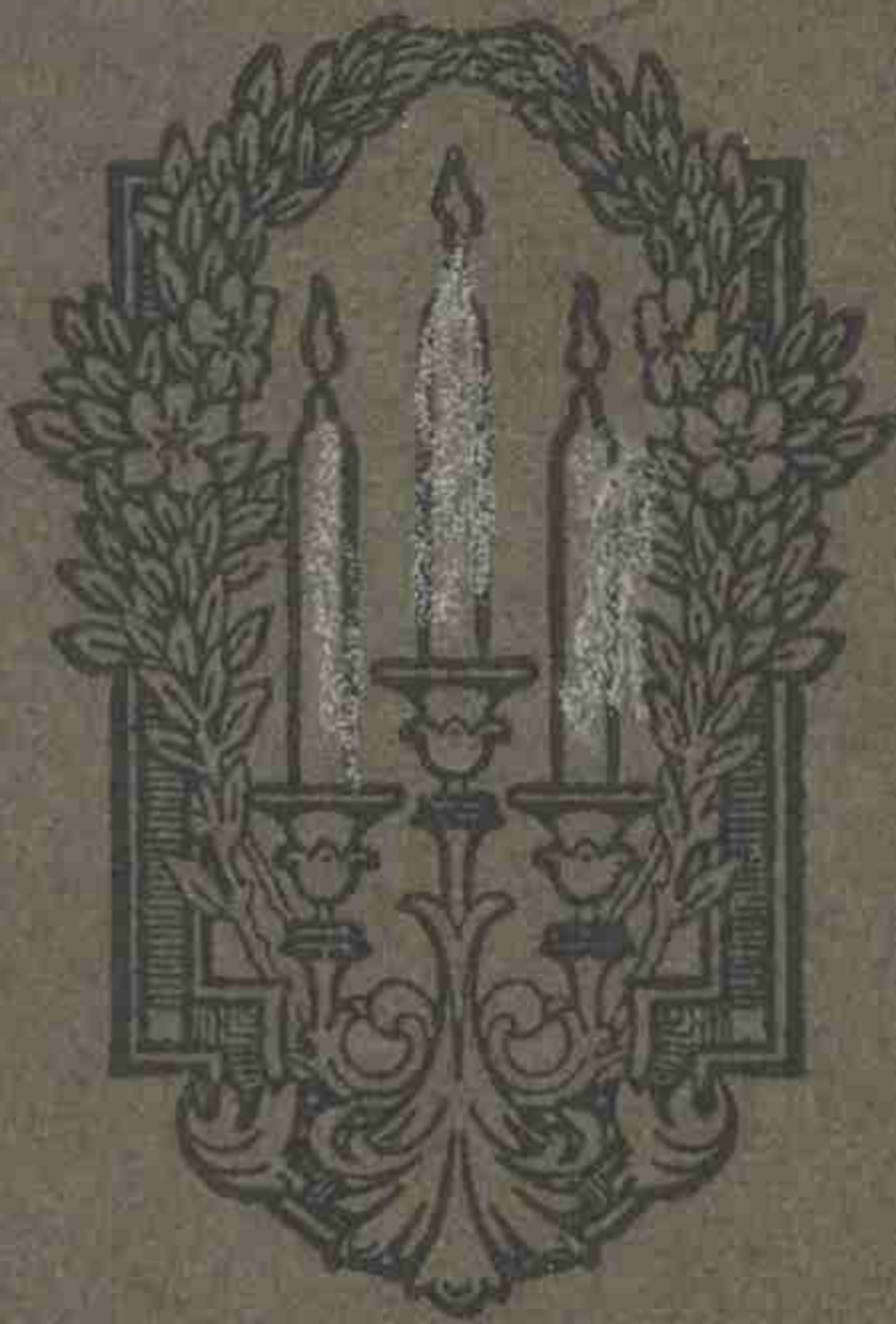
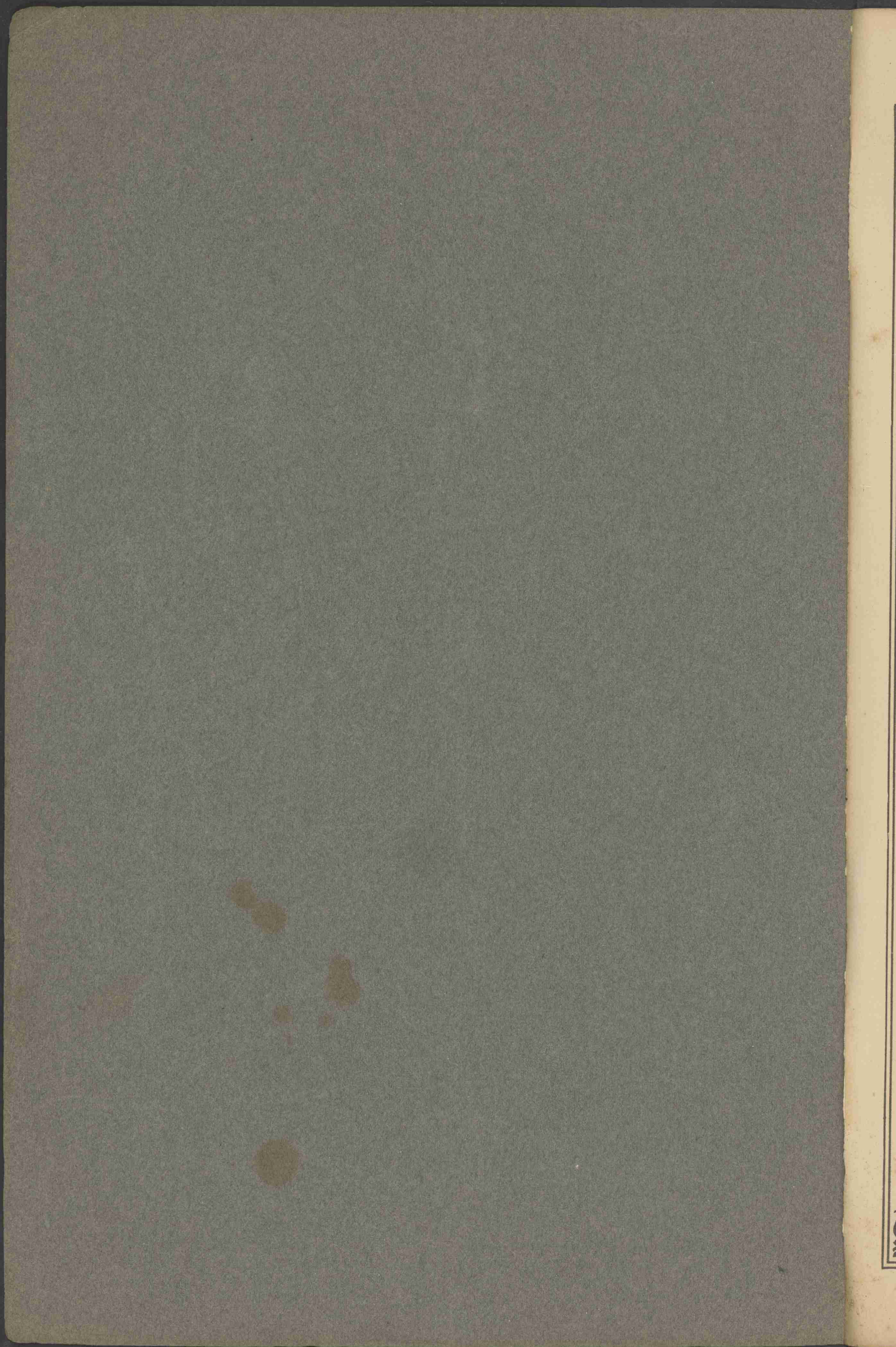

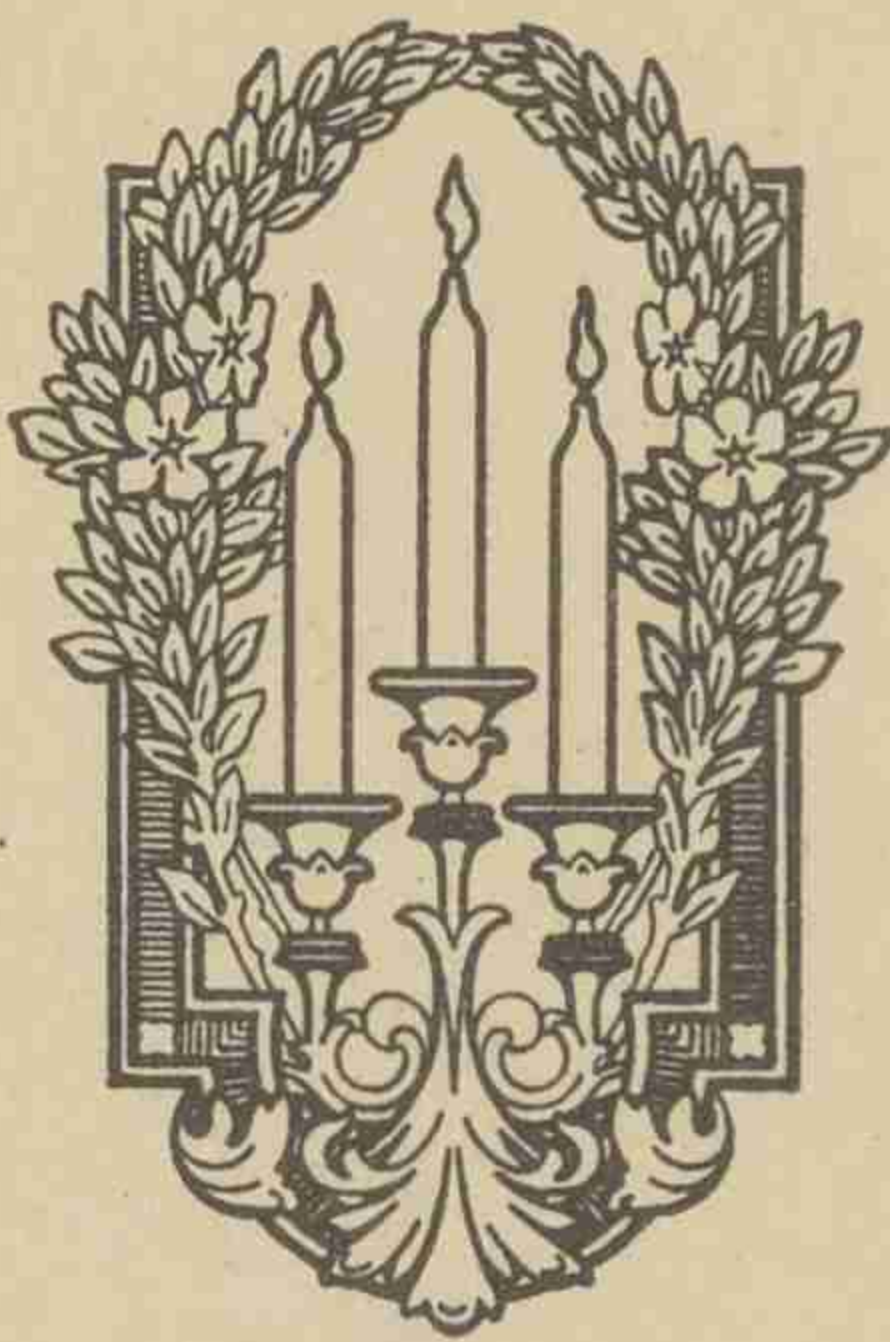

The first great Christmas Carol was sung amid the stars,
out of doors, about the fields of Judea.

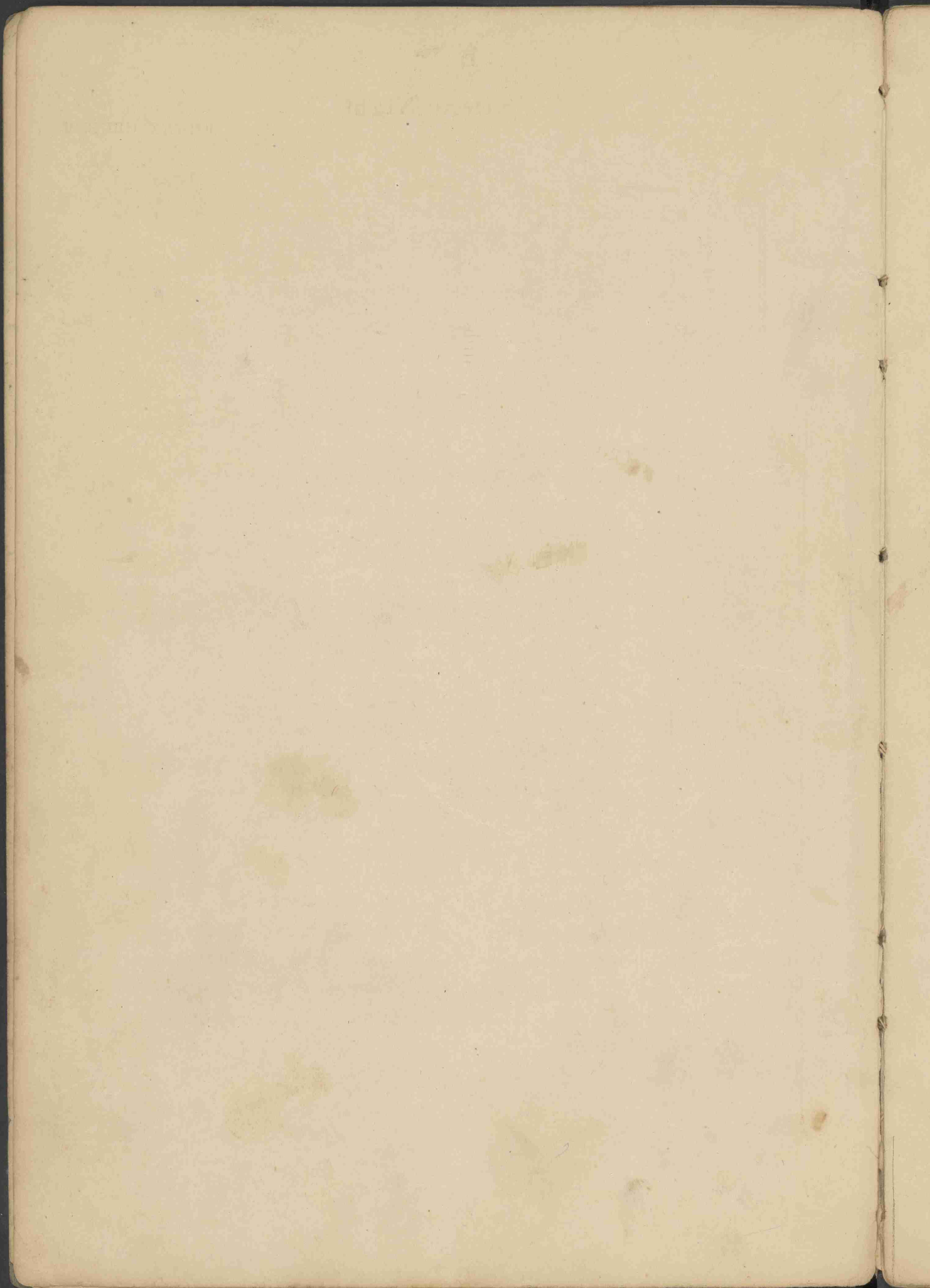
In the Middle Ages strolling minstrels and groups of little
children went from door to door in the streets and lanes of
England singing carols which voiced the joy of the season.

This custom is commended by Herrick in the following
enthusiastic appeal:

"What sweeter musick can we bring,
Then a Carroll, for to sing
The Birth of this our heavenly King?
Awake the Voice! Awake the String!
Heart, Eare and Eye and everything
Awake
The Darling of the world has come,
And fit it is, we finde a Roome
To welcome Him. The nobler part
Of all the house here, is the heart,
Which we will give Him, and bequeath
This Hollie, and this Ivie Wreath,
To do Him honour; Who's our King
And Lord of all this rejoicing."
