Death's voice no more My soul shall hear, His stealthy footsteps No more dread.

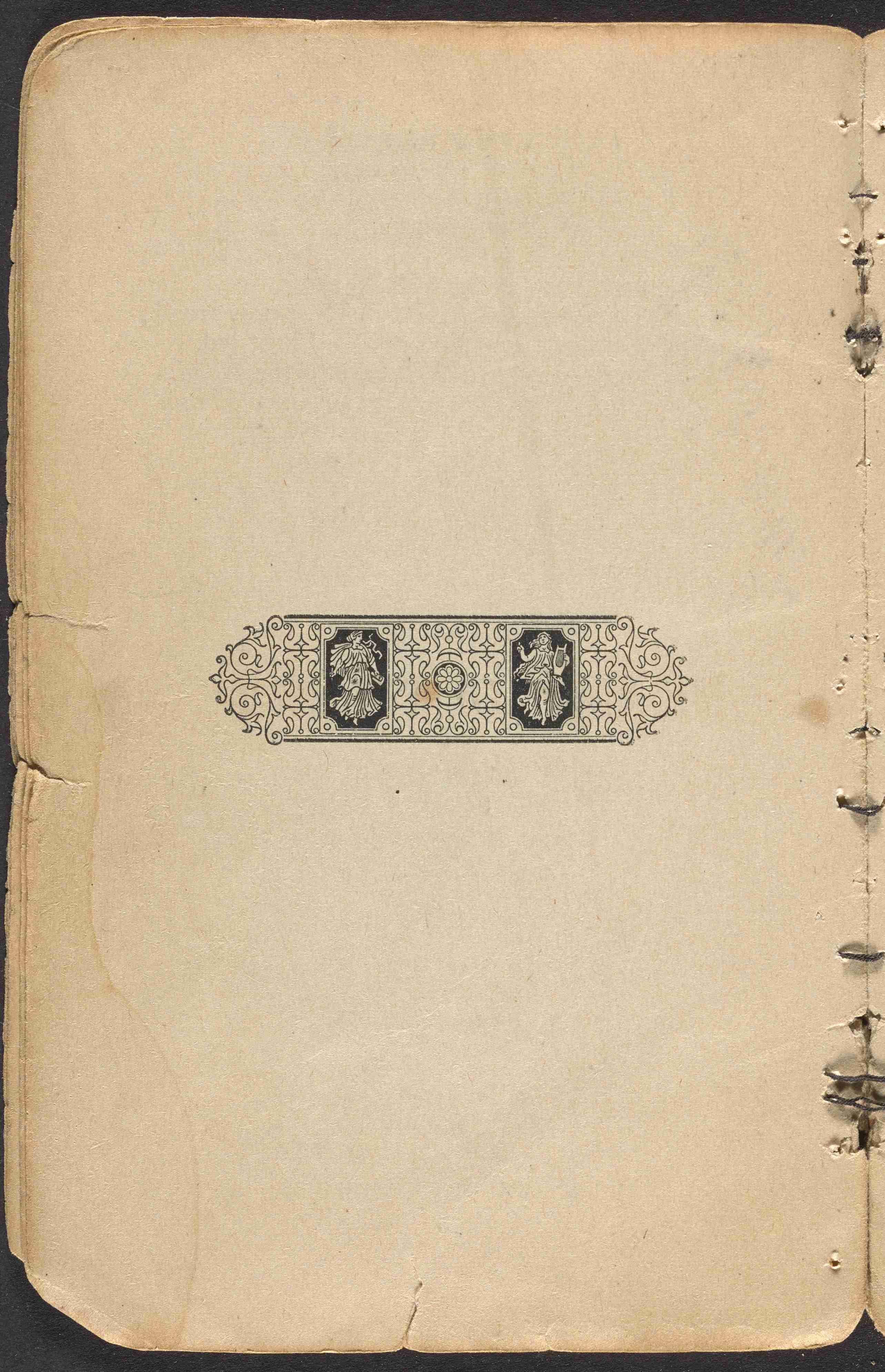
The pearly gates fly wide to me,
