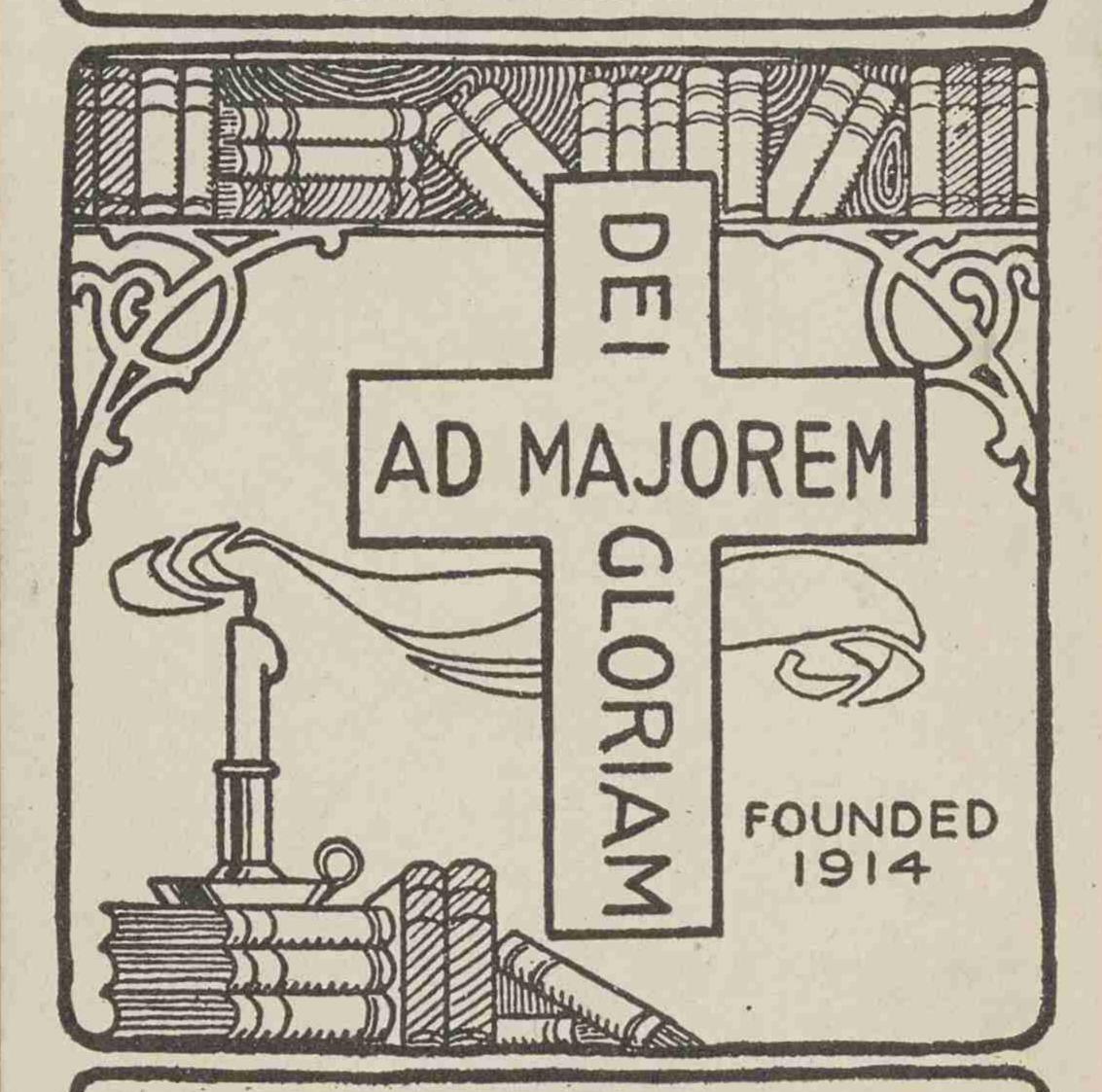

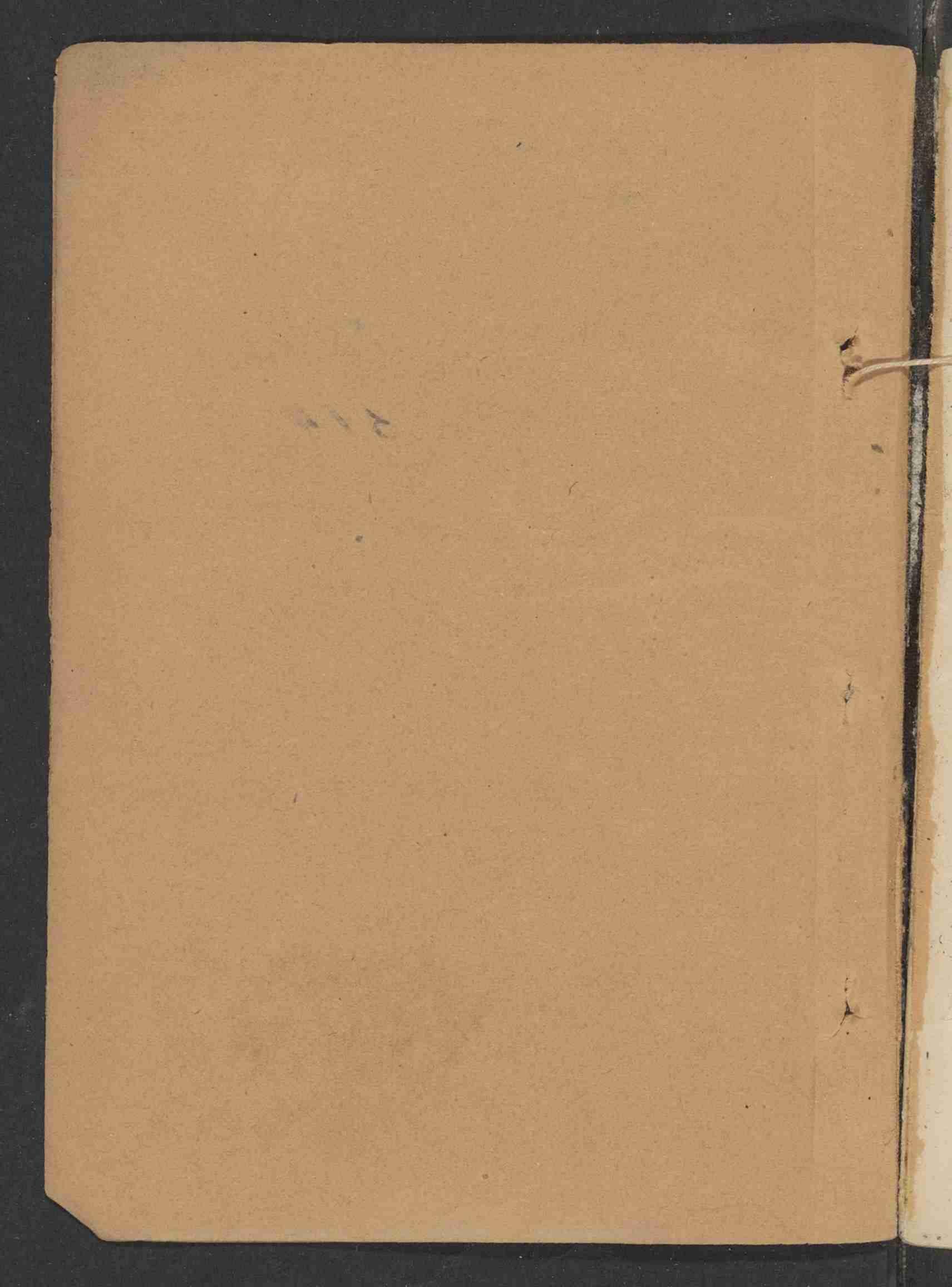

PREFACE TO FOURTH EDITION.

Our former editions rapidly exhausted, and meeting the highest commendations of the best judges, we are encouraged to issue this, with improvements, adding more than fifty Hymns. May it meet the felt want of many.

We find in many modern books worthless hymns attached to good tunes. We have sought to set the best tunes to the best hymns. Having an extensive acquaintance with the hymns and tunes sung in all parts of the Union, we have, with great labor, endeavored to present you, in this little book, the choicest found in our language; among which will be found some excellent English Hymns not heretofore published in this country we think. The hymns are not mere fragments, but of good length.

We could find no one book, even three times the size and price of this, that contains as much Gospel, fitly expressed, as this, and were constrained to prepare this for our meetings, that all might have a book and sing our best hymns. So that we trust you will find them worthy of frequent reading and committing to memory, as well as singing, and thus obtain permanent benefit for your mind and heart while you live. Let us always seek communion with Jesus in singing them.

Our experience, and that of those with whom we have labored, is that this book is a powerful aid in promoting a

revival. There are many pious laymen, if they would take it, and go out in destitute regions and hold Prayer Meetings, if they could do little but pray and sing these hymns, who would win souls to Christ. Try it.

We hope these hymns will be used in Family Worship and in Sunday Schools; as children are very fond of them.

We have made some alterations and additions, and inserted a few of our own. Hymns altered, arranged, &c., are marked with initials of the compiler.

Note Books, with the tunes, furnished to those who desire them. Six sevenths of the tunes are in Winnowed Hymns (W. H.) and Praises of Jesus (P. J.); a few (14 tunes) mostly well known in Song Evangel (S. E.) and Gospel Hymns (G. H. & S. S.) If any should want all the four books, or three of them, a satisfactory arrangement as to price will be made.

The copyright will preclude the use of many of these hymns without the consent of publisher.

The "Golden Chain."—Jesus, Holiness, Usefulness, Happiness, Heaven.

PRAYER.

O blessed Saviour, Thou hast paid my debt on the cross. I can never love Thee enough for this. How wicked I have been not to love Thee, and still worse to break Thy holy laws. Show me what a sinner I have been, and make me sorry and ashamed, and VERY HUMBLE. O forgive me and help me "just now" to give up every sin.

I take Thee to be my Saviour and my King.

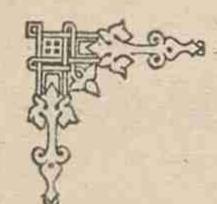
I give myself to Thee to be Thine forever. Help me to do it with all my heart. Take me "just as I am," a lost, helpless sinner.

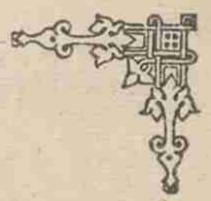

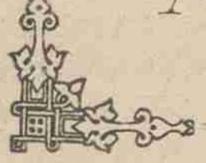

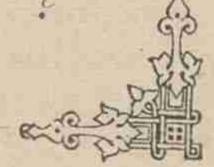

QUESTIONS.

My heart, mind, body, soul, tongue, time, strength, influence, talents, money, belong to God. By God's help, have I made an entire surrender of all to Him, and set myself apart to His service forever? I Cor. 6: 19-20. Rom. 12: 1.

Does He dwell in me and keep me from sin? Rom. 6: 1, 14. I John, 5: 18.

Do I ask expecting it? Matt. 1: 21. Titus, 2: 14.

Do I earnestly ask Him to show me my faults and the wants of my soul? Psalm, 139: 23, 24.

When I see what is wrong, leaning on Him, am I kept

Am I making any discoveries in the science of holy living? Have I any new experience to speak of, or am I dumb on the subject of religion, in Christian society, in the prayer-meeting, or with the impenitent? If so, I am not walking by faith and led by the Spirit. John, 14: 26; 16: 13.

Is Jesus near and precious? Psalm 73: 23.

Do I look to HIM for comfort or to the WORLD?

Do I control my tongue and my temper?

Does my religion sweeten my disposition? Col. 3: 12-14.

Am I growing in humility and meekness?

Who am I praying for? I Tim. 2: 1.

Do I act as if I believed sinners around me were going to hell? Luke 16: 27, 28.

Do I waste time? Ephesians 5: 16.

Do I make, save and GIVE all I can for God's kingdom? Matt. 25: 14-30.

Do I take Jesus with me in all my work, study, or play? Psalm 16: 8.

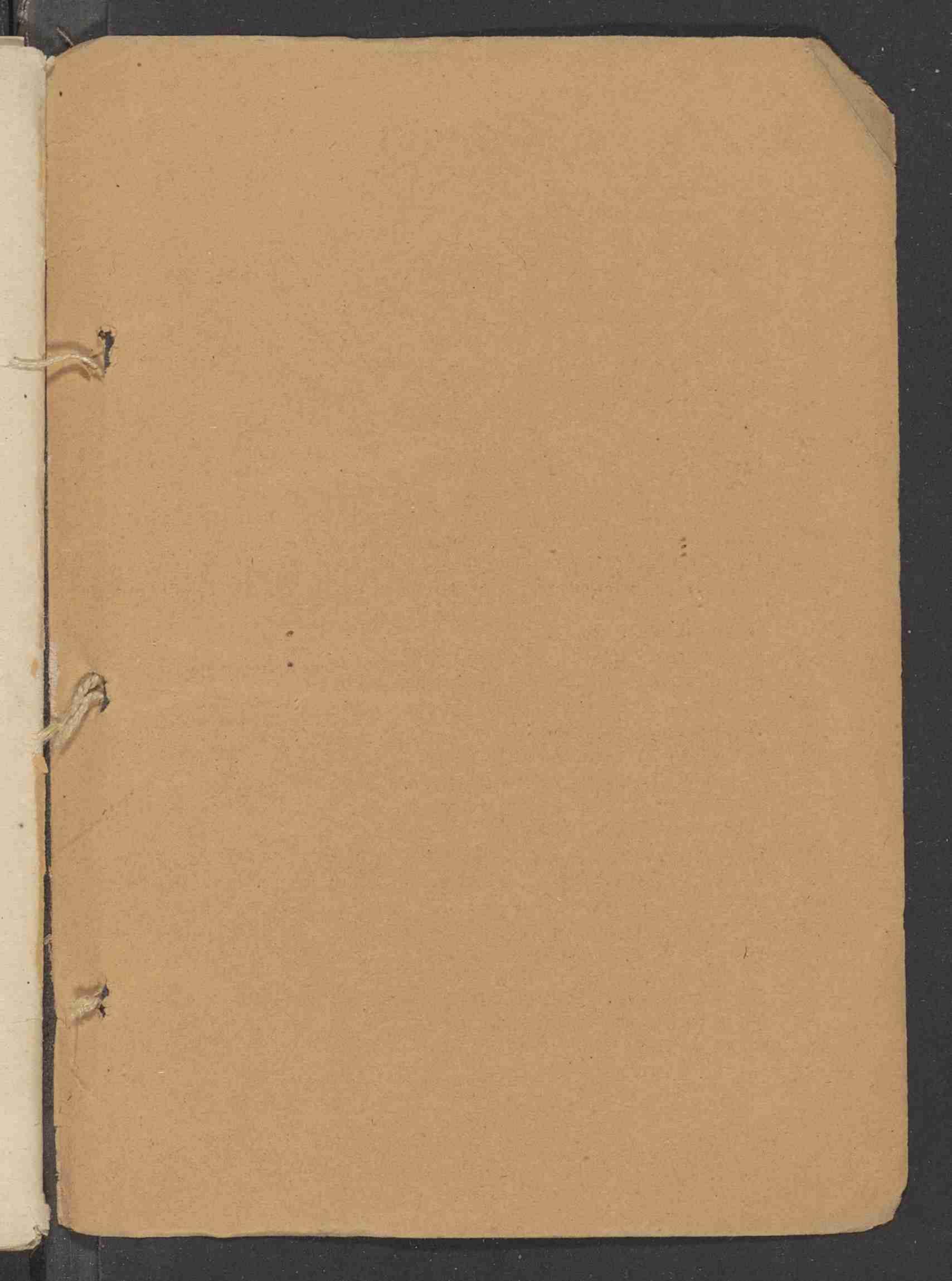
