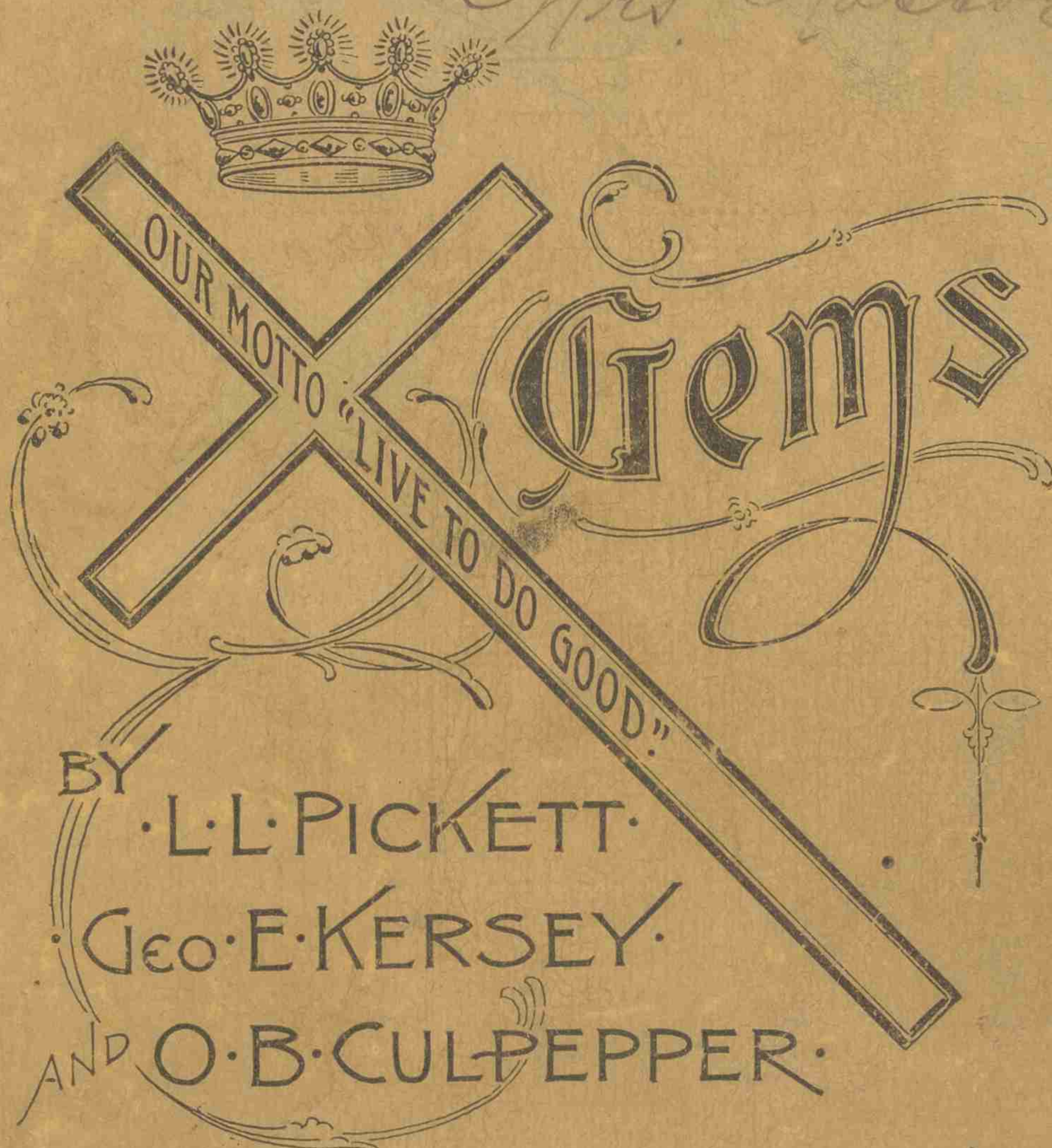

READ THIS-- THEN SING.

We sing for Jesus, and trust all who use these songs may be thereby helped nearer Him. Our other books have reached an extensive circulation. We have worked faithfully to surpass, if possible, the merits of our former publications with this. To singers we suggest:

1. Enter the spirit of your song.

2. Articulate distinctly. In good singing every word is plainly uttered, that the congregation may understand. Many choirs so mumble the words as to make them indistinguishable. This should never be.

3. Some songs should be sung fast and with jubilation; for example, No. 4. Some slowly, thoughtfully; for illustration, No. 90. Some can be made more effective by singing certain parts slowly and other parts faster; see No. 20, in which the chorus should be joyous, while the verses are solemn. In other hymns even verses vary. Effective singing takes all these things into consideration.

4. This book is adapted to the home circle and general religious meetings, including revivals, leagues, Sunday-schools, etc.

5. Please try at least the following Nos.: 3, 8, 17, 22, 29, 30, 36, 69, 73, 83, 86, 87, 106, 112, 121, 135, 147 (for children), 153, 154, 169, 174, 182, 189, 193, 267, 271, 279, 285. You will also find a lot of choice hymns without music. For many of these the tunes can be found in our other books, "Tears and Triumphs Combined" (abbreviated T. & T.) or "Cheerful Songs." Let us together seek the glory of our King.
