


The programme is made up principally from the "Slave Songs" or "Spirituals" sung by the Negro Slaves of the Southern States.

Sweetly solemn, wildly sad."







Five of the eight singers were members of the original company, viz:—Ella Sheppard, Maggie Porter, Jennie Jackson, Mabel Lewis, and F. J. Loudin. Patti Malone is a student of the University, and sang with the company the year in Germany. The tenor singers of the old company having resumed their studies, Messrs. Hall and Barrett have been secured to fill their places.

As the net results of their labors during the past eight years, a site for the University containing twenty-five acres, has been purchased, and Jubilee Hall built at a cost of over \$150.000. About \$15.000 was secured towards building Livingstone Missionary Hall, also a large amount of material for the University—money and books for the library, Philosophical apparatus, musical instruments, furniture, specimens for the museum, paintings and other works of art, etc., aggregating many thousands of dollars in value.
